BOARD ADOPTS 2001 BUDGET; APPROVES NEW DEMOGRAPHY TEAM

The Board of Directors of the PAA met October 20th in Washington DC, with Suzanne Bianchi presiding. Kathleen Mullan Harris, chair of the Finance Committee, reported that the Association remains in good financial shape, with assets of \$948,980 and liabilities of \$267,664, for a net worth of \$681,315 on September 30.

The Board adopted the budget for 2001 that the Finance Committee had discussed at its meeting the previous evening. The budget projects revenues totalling \$649,252 and authorizes expenditures totalling \$647,335. Changes from the 2000 budget included:

- Dues income expected to decrease slightly, to \$190,000.
- Demography subscription income about the same as last year's, at \$115,000.
- A five-percent increase in personnel costs, for salary increases and higher health insurance premiums.
- A one-time expenditure to move the on-line directory from the University of Michigan site to Net On-Line, which is the host of PAA's web site. (Michigan had designed and programmed the directory free of charge for the Association.)
- An anticipated increase in rent, following our move from a building scheduled for demolition.
- Expenditures from the PAA Fund to start the new project for outreach to minority students, approved at the March 2000 Board meeting.

Among the tasks of the International Outreach Committee is to implement programs funded by the Hewlett and Mellon foundations for travel awards for scholars from developing countries, and subsidized subscriptions and PAA memberships. The Board approved a suggestion from the Committee that we increase the number of subsidized subscriptions for institutions. The Committee members will identify institutions in developing countries

and Eastern Europe that would benefit from this subsidy and will explore how best to provide access to print and electronic versions of our publications. Suzanne Bianchi expressed the Board's appreciation for the "terrific job" done by the committee under Tom LeGrand's chairmanship. Mike Koenig will succeed him as chair. Monica Das Gupta agreed to serve as the Board's new liaison to the International Outreach Committee.

The PAA Publications Committee recommended approval of a proposal from Ohio State University to house the journal Demography, beginning with volume 38 (2001), and the Board adopted the recommendation unanimously.

The new editor, Daniel Lichter, is Lazarus Professor of Population Studies. Randy Olsen and Elizabeth Cooksey will serve as Assistant Editors. The Committee noted that "Dan's record of research and service amply qualify him to be editor," and expressed appreciation for Ohio State's offer of "excellent human and physical resources to assist him with this job." Board members also appreciated the work of outgoing editors Barbara Entwisle and Philip Morgan, their editorial board and assistants. Managing editor Laura Tesch and copy editor Karen Feinberg have been asked to continue to serve in these positions.

The Board expressed support of a plan by Steve Ruggles at the University of Minnesota to revive Population Index as an on-line bibliographic resource for demographers, with expanded coverage on such topics as family demography and the demography of aging. PAA will also provide some financial support for the planning and transition.

One of the vital tasks managed by Executive Director Stephanie Dudley is the selection, years in advance, of sites for PAA annual meetings. She uses a list of eight criteria, one of which is "flexible meeting and exhibit space in one hotel at minimal cost". This is becoming tricky, as suitable hotels increasingly demand guaranteed minimum expenditures for catering that exceed our relatively abstemious preferences. At this meeting, the Board approved Stephanie's plan to designate Philadelphia and Washington as preferred sites for the 2005 meeting, giving

her some room in further negotiations. Watch this space for an announcement!

The PAA web site (www.popassoc.org) has recently been re-designed. Board member Doug Ewbank volunteered to serve as advisor to Stephanie Dudley on standards for what should be posted.

Board members finishing their terms this year – Bill Axinn, Greg Duncan, Kathy Mullan Harris, and Tukufu Zuberi – were thanked for stalwart service to the association and the profession, as was Andrew Cherlin, Past President, whose term on the Board also ends December 31, 2000.

ELECTRONIC PUBLISHING – WHAT’S HAPPENED, AND WHAT TO EXPECT

Thanks to the work of an Ad Hoc Committee on Electronic Publishing, the PAA has recently concluded new agreements and moved forward on several tasks. This Committee, which presented its final report to the Board of Directors in March 2000, was chaired by Myron Gutmann, with Todd Gardner, David Lam, and John Marcotte as members.

Demography

The PAA has actually been involved in a form of electronic publishing since August 1996, when an agreement was signed with JSTOR (an acronym for “Journal Storage”). This is a nonprofit organization created and originally funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to make available electronic images of back issues of scholarly journals. The goals were to ease the space burden on libraries, overcome the problem of physical deterioration of old journals, and ensure that users would always have access to the issues they needed. Currently over 165 journals are available through JSTOR, including all the major American journals in the Social Sciences and Humanities (see www.jstor.org).

Originally all annual volumes of Demography except the most recent five were available through JSTOR. Beginning in 2001, all volumes except the most recent two will be available.

Beginning with volume 38, no. 1 (February 2001), all issues of Demography will be published on-line through Project MUSE, at the same time as print publication. Project MUSE will make the journal available in highly accessible hypertext format, appearing on the web as a complete issue, with Table of Contents and abstracts. Beginning January 2, 2001, PAA members can log on to <http://muse.jhu.edu/journals/dem>, login/username *life* password *table*, and view the demonstration issue, Volume 37, Number. 4. The PAA website (www.popassoc.org) will also have a link to the demonstration issue.

Project MUSE was begun in 1995 by The Johns Hopkins University Press, originally funded by grants from the Mellon Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities, to publish on-line 42 Johns Hopkins journals. The project has expanded to include over 170 journals, published by many university presses, with good coverage of the Humanities, Social Sciences, and Life Sciences. In 1998, Project MUSE began paying royalties to participating journals. There are more than 900 subscribers, mainly college libraries, which pay site licenses varying according to the size of the institution. The agreement between PAA and Project Muse runs for three years, after which it is annually renewed unless either side withdraws.

Both the JSTOR and Project MUSE agreements include provisions to indemnify the PAA for any decline in print subscriptions during the first years after beginning electronic publishing. The details of the calculations are complicated, as are the calculations for the royalty shares. Their experience so far has been that very few subscribers to scholarly journals cancel their print subscriptions after on-line publishing begins. For example, no journal joining Project MUSE reported more than 32 cancellations through 1998, and the average was less than 10.

Of course, it is impossible for anyone to predict the economic future for scholarly publishing. The PAA Board and Committee on Publications will have to try to keep abreast of a changing environment and find sustainable ways to make the results of high-quality research in the population sciences known and available.

Directory

The PAA Directory is now on-line, thanks to the work of Michael McIntyre and colleagues at the Population Studies Center at the University of Michigan. It can be reached

through www.popassoc.org. It is currently housed on a Michigan server, but will soon be moved to the server of NetOn-Line Services, which hosts the PAA website. PAA staff members prepare quarterly updates of the Directory, so the days of hand-scrawled corrections on old copies may be a thing of the past. One useful feature is that users can type in an institution or a city, and the Directory will come back with a list of PAA members there. The Directory has safeguards to make it hard for unauthorized users to create mass mailing lists.

PAA Affairs

For the time being, PAA Affairs will still be printed and mailed four times a year in hard copy. The Board has decided to continue to post issues on the web site, and eventually make PAA Affairs primarily an electronic newsletter. Members will still have the option to receive a hard-copy printout sent through the regular mail, however.

What does all this mean for members?

Members will still receive Demography in hard copy. In addition, all PAA members will have access to the on-line version, even if they are not at one of the institutions that subscribe to Project Muse, using the login *life* password *table*.

Those who publish in Demography should benefit from the new technology in scholarly publishing and information retrieval. For example, articles in Demography will be found by those using search engines to scan full text for key words. Articles will be easy to include in on-line curricula or bibliographies (with the authors' permission). Other on-line publications will be able to refer readers to Demography through hyperlinks. These are new ways to fulfill the old mission of promoting "research with respect to the problems connected with human population... and the dissemination and publication of such research."

Lee A. Lillard III
November 12, 1943 - December 2, 2000



Lee A. Lillard III, director of the University of Michigan Retirement Research Center, died December 2 at his home in Ann Arbor after a heart attack. He was 57. An applied econometrician and labor economist who worked jointly with many

and diverse co-authors, Lillard made important contributions to the study of life-cycle earnings, marriage, fertility, divorce, mortality, intergenerational mobility, and a wide variety of other issues of general interest.

He served as a member of the steering committee of the Health and Retirement Study, directed by Robert J. Willis. "Lee was my friend, collaborator and colleague for more than 25 years," said Willis. "Throughout his career he made significant and immediate contributions to his profession with his keen intellect and intense commitment to doing the best possible social science research. His leadership of the Michigan Retirement Research Center reflected his commitment to giving public policy a firm basis in social science."

Before joining the U-M in 1998, Lillard spent 20 years with RAND in Santa Monica, California, where he held a variety of positions. "As the founding director of RAND's Center for the Study of Aging, he established one of the leading research programs on aging in the world," said James P. Smith, a friend and RAND colleague. While at RAND, he received a National Institute on Aging MERIT Award, the most prestigious award given by National Institutes of Health.

"Lee was well known in the fields of economics and demography as an incredibly energetic researcher who was always eager to expand into new fields," said David Lam. "He was also a great collaborator who was committed to interdisciplinary research. We will greatly miss his enthusiastic personality and his exceptional research abilities."

Born November 12, 1943, in Arlington, Texas, Lillard received a B.S. degree in mathematics in 1966 from the University of Texas at Arlington, an M.A. in

economics in 1968 from Southern Methodist University, and an M.S. in 1970 and a joint Ph.D. in economics and statistics from North Carolina State University in 1972. Before joining RAND in 1978, he served as a research associate and project director at the National Bureau of Economic Research. During his career, he also held visiting positions at various universities and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"Lee was painstakingly careful with data," said Finis Welch, distinguished professor of economics at Texas A & M University, a friend and colleague who was Lillard's teacher and mentor at SMU. "He was also an extraordinarily competent analyst and the most energetic researcher I have ever known. I have seen many hard workers. Most burn out after a few years. None surpassed Lee in dedication and effort."

Lillard is survived by his daughter, Jennifer of Los Angeles, California; his father, Lee A. Lillard II of Granbury, Texas; and his grandmother, Lucille Lillard of Arlington, Texas. He was preceded in death by his mother, Harriet Jean Lillard. Burial will be in Arlington, with a memorial service planned for January 2001 in Ann Arbor. Joseph Allan Beegle

September 13, 1918 - September 8, 2000

J. Allan Beegle served on the faculties in the Department of Sociology and the Agricultural Experiment Station of Michigan State University from October, 1945 - Summer, 1988. To date, his nearly 43 years of service is one of the longest on record for a member of any MSU faculties.

Al was in the forefront in other important ways. In collaboration with Charles Loomis, Al published three major books in 1950 (Rural Social Systems), 1957 (Rural Sociology: The Strategy of Change), and 1975 (A Strategy for Rural Change) that squarely placed his scientific contributions at the crossroads of Demography, Sociology, and Rural Sociology. Structural Functionalism was the paradigm that then best explained social stability but could not interpret the rapid social changes occurring after World War II. Al's work tested the boundaries of that paradigm by using knowledge of what promotes social stability in rural places in the United States to find paths towards planned rural social change. As a Sociologist-Demographer, he was especially interested in factors promoting the net rural-to-urban migration after World War II and the net backflow in the 1970s and in factors closing the rural-urban gap in fertility.

While Al's work for the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station was necessarily focussed on Michigan and the United States, he inspired several generations of international students who explored applications of Rural Sociology and Demography to a broader, global context. Al is survived by his wife of 49 years, Ruth M. Beegle; three daughters, Margaret (Steven Loubert), Katherine (Michael Cerreta), and Grace (Vern) Pierce; a son Allan Paul (Suzanne Yunker); 10 grandchildren; three sisters; and one brother.

The Population Fellows Programs offer two-year professional fellowships to individuals with graduate degrees in population dynamics, reproductive health, and development-related areas. The first position is for a demography/health policy specialist with the **Institute of Policy Studies Health Policy Program** in Sri Lanka. The Institute is an independent policy research institute and international resource center established in 1989. The Health Policy Program aims to build a long-term research program in health, population, and nutrition that will inform public policy decision-making. The Institute seeks a Ph.D. in demography, public health, or a related field to strengthen its technical expertise in population research and policy and to further linkages with population researchers, policymakers, and practitioners in Sri Lanka as well as with other regional centers.

The second position is for a demographer/researcher with the **Medecins Sans Frontieres (MSF) Aral Sea Area Programme** in Uzbekistan. Based in Uzbekistan and northern Turkmenistan, the Aral Sea Area Programme is an MSF response to the area's recent environmental devastation caused by a cotton irrigation scheme. Increased levels of saline and chemicals now contaminate the area's groundwater, earth, and air, and have done uncalculated damage to the local population's health and quality of life. Notes from the Public Affairs Committee

As we go to press, awaiting the outcome of the national election, we face a situation with no certainties other than the certainty of change. The Public Affairs Committee will be active during the coming transition period and asks that PAA members be prepared to respond to future calls for participation.

A detailed report on the four major areas of concern as determined by the PAA Board: the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the National Science Foundation (NSF), the US Census Bureau and international population research programs of the US Agency for International Development (USAID) will be published in the Spring issue of PAA Affairs.
